Leaders will indicate the difficulty of the walk so walkers can make an informed choice on whether or not to join in. Appropriate clothing and footwear should be worn.

Swynnerton, Beech and Tittensor Chase – 5.5m – Thursday 19th June



This circular walk starts and finishes at the Fitzherbert Arms, Swynnerton.

The route is a mixture of mainly quiet roads and footpaths. However, our departure, and return to the village, is via roads where vehicles could be travelling at speed, so it's essential to walk on the right and in <u>single file</u> on these sections. As we leave the village, you'll see a Victorian water tower on the right, and, soon after, a view point on the left, looking towards the Wrekin, where we'll

pause briefly before continuing on the route of the Stone Circles Challenge. On reaching Beech, we go through Beech Dale, passing the caves where and over the M6 to the outskirts of Tittensor, where we'll pause again for a short break and a group photo. At this point, we pick up the route of the Two Saints Way, (there are a couple of well-maintained stiles at this point), then on to Tittensor Chase, before heading back for Lunch.

St Bartholomew's Church, Tong

A Car Visit and lunch on Wednesday 25th June



A day not to be missed.

This visit is definitely going ahead and there still plenty of spaces available. St Bartholomew's Church at Tong is renowned as a 'treasure house', it's historical and architectural significance being well documented. It is a Grade 1 listed building because the present church has remained almost intact for 600 years with only one later addition, the chantry chapel - called 'The Golden Chapel' because of its rich colouring and magnificent fan-vaulting. The church, together with a priests' College (now disappeared) and Infirmary (ruined) were the inspiration of Isabel de Pembrugge in the early 15th century. The misericords in the chancel testify to her desire for 13 poor people to be cared for by 5 clergy provided they prayed there 3 times a day and said masses for her deceased husbands.

It has a superb collection of medieval alabaster tombs and effigies, original carvings and brass work. The church is unusual as it has a central square tower that becomes octagonal just above the roof level with an octagonal spire on top. It houses the Great Bell of Tong, the largest swung bell in Shropshire dating from 1518.

The tour will take us around the church and it's surrounds and tell of its literary connections (Shakespeare and Dickens) as well as royal historical associations: Henry Tudor, Catherine of Aragon and King Charles II, following his escape after the Battle of Worcester when he hid at Boscobel nearby.

The tour will be followed by lunch in the Parish Rooms.

In the process of lots of rain dances, we've also set up and installed the absolutely fantastic Davis weather station! We can now confidentially and accurately record data with an aim to evaluate the impact of the climate and the gardens resilience.
